



# Clark Tug

One of our previous newsletters spoke of the challenges of getting the Heavy AA qun out of the store.

Our problems may soon be solved with the arrival of a Clark Tug at Godley Head. These hefty little workhorses were used during WWII to tow bombs for loading onto aircraft. With its low profile, it could be driven neatly under the wings. It was also used for towing planes on aircraft carriers.

Selwyn Frewin who has leant the Trust his Tug, will be working on its restoration with other Trust members. Hopefully it will soon be back in service, hauling the 3.7 Heavy AA gun out and back in again.

Imagine a military museum at Godley Head. This dream may become a reality.


The Trust is working on a concession application to the Department of Conservation to gain security of tenure for the Regimental Headquarters' building.


# Saving the Past

# Repair work

Progress has been made with remedial work on the underground magazines and gun emplacements. With money allocated by the government for historic maintenance at Godley Head, the roof of the gun emplacements has been stripped off and new bitumen type cladding installed. This will help weather-proof the emplacements.

No. 3 magazine (the large one) now has a handrail alongside the steep stairs. When

this magazine is opened for visitors they will not longer have gingerly climb d o w n clutching onto the wall. With new lighting, this will make the magazine a safer area to visit. It is closed to the public except for open days.

# Volunteer workday

On Saturday 27 March, a group of PD workers under the supervison of Patrick Lyons, dug out the Taylor Battery 60 pounder gun site.

The large concrete pad and eyebolts were buried under 40cm of compacted soil. The PD gang dug it out and left the soil in a large heap.

On Sunday, despite strong Nor-west winds blowing dirt everywhere, Trust volunteers and DOC staff filled four truck loads with the spoil and transported it up hill to the flag pole. Here it was shovelled out to level the area where the ground had subsided.

Ian Hill, Peter Wilkins and Mike Ray painstakingly drilled into the very solid concrete walls of the miniature range, engine room and plotting room, and installed the new interpretation panels. Even while they were doing the work, visitors were reading the panels. The area is getting increasing usage, and the interpretation will make a visit more meaningful.

While this was going on, Bill Mooar and Graeme Hines water-blasted the 3.7 Heavy AA gun that was recently soda blasted to remove all its layers of paint. The gun is

now back to bare metal, and will be repainted.

After a BBQ lunch, the wind died down, leaving temperatures pretty hot, but the work was finished and tired workers went home.

#### Vandalism

The day after the new interpretation panels were installed, someone 'coined' them scratching a line across the new panels. Vandalism is a continuing problem at the Head. When the emplacments were being constructed in October 1939, a group of youth used 'abusive language' at the contractors, pushed a roll of reinforcing steel over the cliff and damaged the fences.

On a happier note, the graffiti in the gun emplacements has been soda blasted off. We hope that with more visitors to the head, vandalism will be discouraged.
